Opponents of Racist Washington Football Mascot to Hold Event On-Site at NFL Fall League Meeting

U.S. lawmakers, Native American leaders, public health professionals and student activists will be among those gathering at the Ritz -Carlton Hotel in Washington, DC to discuss the growing Change the Mascot movement

ONEIDA NATION HOMELANDS (NY) (October 3, 2013) A hotel in our nation's capital will next week be the site for both the NFL's Fall League Meeting and a high-level symposium on why Washington's NFL team should end its use of a racial slur as its mascot.

The Oneida Indian Nation will be holding a public conference on Monday, October 7 that will feature congressional lawmakers and other leaders who have joined its "Change the Mascot" campaign.

The Oneida Indian Nation, which is a sponsor of the NFL, is convening the meeting only weeks after its "Change the Mascot" national radio advertising campaign prompted NFL officials to urge that the league and its teams listen to those who are offended by Washington's derogatory team name and mascot. The meeting comes just a few months after students at the Cooperstown (NY) Central School District generated national headlines by voting to stop using the same racial slur for their team's name.

The conference, which will be open to the press and the public, will be a chance for NFL officials, policymakers, and other concerned citizens to hear from federal legislators, community leaders and experts about the campaign. Among those speaking will be:
